What is AERO?

AERO is a secure web-based online service that provides alternative-format textbooks. For example, students who are blind or have low vision can have their textbooks converted to Braille, large print or digital audio. If a textbook is not available, AERO works with the publisher and partners to provide the student with the text in the format he or she needs.

AERO allows us to submit all our publisher requests for textbooks in one place instead of using several publisher websites. This saves us time and creates a better workflow. Searching through the catalogue of existing titles and downloading is fast and seamless and this improves the amount of turnaround time in responding to a student's request.

How does AERO work?

STEP 1

A student buys a hard copy of a textbook. He or she then takes the receipt and the book to the college or university student disabilities services office or library and asks for the book in an alternative format. To qualify for this service, the student must:

- meet eligibility requirements for perceptual disability
- sign an agreement confirming that the electronic copy will be used only for their own academic purpose and will not be copied or shared.

STEP 2

The college or university checks the AERO database to see if the textbook is available. If it is, the file can be downloaded immediately and/or mailed to the institution. If not, AERO asks the publisher for a digital copy.

STEP 3

The textbook is converted to the appropriate alternative format and the student is notified by email when the textbook is ready.

For years universities and colleges in Ontario have been looking for a collaborative solution to obtain alternate format textbooks for students in a timely manner.

AERO is the collaborative solution and will have a positive effect on the education experience of postsecondary students with print disabilities in Ontario.
